The Nobleman's Son Healed

Introduction

- 1. We learn many spiritual lessons concerning Jesus through His miracles and incidents that He is involved with.

 We learn:
 - A. The kind of Savior Jesus is.
 - B. How He deals with the souls of men for their own good.
 - C. The blessings He brings to those He prepares to receive.
- 2. These lessons are brought before us in this narrative, so simple and so natural in itself, yet deep in its significance!

 John 4:43-54

Verses 43-44

- 1. Jesus leaves Judea because of opposition to His word by the Pharisees (chapter 4).
 - A. The proverb of verse 44 attests to this fact

Matt 13:57 So they were offended at Him. But Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honor except in his own country and in his own house."

- 1) Judea was His home
- 2) He was born in Bethlehem
- 3) It was the seat of Jewish worship and government
- B. John's gospel shows how readily foreigners accepted Jesus, while His own countrymen "his own people" did not.

John 1:11 He came to His own, and His own did not receive Him.

John 5:43 I have come in My Father's name, and you do not receive Me; if another comes in his own name, him you will receive.

John 12:37 But although He had done so many signs before them, they did not believe in Him,

Verse 45

- 1. Like the foreigners, these Galileans received Him.
- 2. It seems that the further He went from Jerusalem ---- the warmer the reception. Why?
 - A. Did the Judeans see the same things Jesus did as did the Galileans?
 - B. Yet, they were not ready to accept His miracles.
 - C. However, we will also see that even some of the Galilean's faith falls under question as the story unfolds.

Verses 46-47

- 1. He returns to the place of His first miracle (John 2:1-11), Cana.
- 2. Some had hearts prepared and ready to receive His message (they were witnesses or perhaps knew of His first miracle).
- 3. He was there long enough for the Nobleman to get word of His location and make the trip to find Him.
 - **A. NOBLEMAN:** "An officer of a King" He may have been serving in the court of Herod Antipas.
- 4. It is important to note that neither "riches" or "office" lifted him above affliction. We must always seek Jesus to obtain true happiness.
- 5. He was no doubt reluctant to leave his son but he knew there was no other hope left but Jesus.
- 6. It was this Nobleman's expectation that Jesus MUST make the trip to Capernaum

Verse 48

- **1. SIGNS:** Deeper truth than what meets the eye.
- **2. WONDERS:** Draws attention to the physical side of His miracles.
- 3. Knowing this man's true heart, He makes this statement: "unless you people see signs and wonders, you will by no means believe."
 - A. These words were not for the Nobleman only but for those who stood by ("you people")

NOTE: The Galileans in general deserved reproof for their lack of faith as He spoke of their cities (Matt 11:20-24). Jesus wanted men to believe in Him because of His self-evidencing character and words (John 10:38; 14:11; 15:22-24; 20:29). But the people required to have their faith strengthened by the performing of miracles.

- 4. The man most likely would NOT have had time for Jesus had it not been for his son's sickness.
- 5. Things happen today to get us to focus or re-focus on God.
- 6. Immediate problem: His son is at the point of death and there's 15 miles to be covered (Cana -Capernaum) before any help can be administered (so he thinks).
- 7. He had some faith.
- 8. His was a faith that believed on outward signs.
 - **A.** "Fledging Faith" Based on testimony of others, i.e. faith built on the teaching by parents, class teachers.
 - **B.** "Satisfying faith" Based on personal investigation, firmly grounded in the word of God and Christ.

Verses 49-51

- 1. Jesus was the one option this Nobleman had.
 - A. He no doubt had heard that Jesus could perform miracles. Maybe there was some hope for his son.
 - B. There was a difference between this Nobleman's faith and the faith of the Centurian in Matthew 8:5-10.
 - C. He felt the presence of Jesus was required to perform the miracle. He also regarded the Lord's power only to the living.
- 2. Jesus announced with certainty "Go your way; your son lives."
 - A. Jesus shows the Nobleman His divine power by showing him that his words take effect without regard to distance: The Bible has been delivered to ALL for ALL time!
- 3. The Nobleman gained confidence, believed Christ's words and immediately turned toward home.

Verses 52-53

- 1. It is now the second day since Jesus pronounced that the boy was healed.
- 2. Growth is evident in the faith of the Nobleman. He first believed in the power of Jesus' presence and then the power of Jesus' word.
- 3. The boy was healed at the exact moment in time that the command by Jesus was given.

NOTE: Jesus commands baptism of us today (Mark 16:16). At what moment in time are our sins forgiven? At the very moment one is immersed!

Some Traits of the Nobleman

- 1. He did not let position, pride, or effort (3,500 foot climb) prevent him from coming to seek Christ's aid.
- 2. He stood the test of his faith.
- 3. He became a witness for the Lord!

Application of the Lesson

- 1. Faith in Christ arises in the soul and He should be the one we desire.
 - A. When a sickness comes upon our own child, then a life of selfishness, pursuit of pleasure, and indifference to spiritualness suddenly becomes secondary.
- 2. A need for a helper now becomes priority one. Faith is planted and then is grown when one turns to Jesus.
- 3. We need to have faith by knowing Jesus can provide and not giving up.
- 4. A weak faith is rebuked.
 - A. Don't limit what we think Christ can do.
- 5. A Sincere faith is rewarded
 - A. The Nobleman had a growing faith. His faith was rewarded by the healing of his son.
- 6. A Sincere faith is contagious!
 - A. As it spread in the Nobleman's family so it will in ours when it is truly exhibited.
