Samuel's Important Words

Introduction

Scripture Reading: 1 Samuel 3:1-10

- 1. Often it is true that we only "hear" what we want to hear.
- 2. If we have a predisposition against God or any part of His will, it will affect our "hearing."
 - A. Those who are not "of God" do not hear Him.
 - **B.** Jesus said to the unbelieving Jews:

John 8:47 He who is of God hears God's words; therefore you do not hear, because you are not of God."

C. How much better it is if we determine to have the attitude expressed in the words of young Samuel:

1 Samuel 3:10 "Speak, for Your servant hears."

3. What is involved in this kind of attitude toward God's word?

Reverence Toward God Himself

- 1. How humble and respectful are we before God?
- 2. Having a receptive attitude toward what God says, is a reverent disposition toward God Himself.

Ecclesiastes 12:13 Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God and keep His commandments, For this is man's all.

Luke 6:46 "But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do the things which I say?

3. We will be eager to hear God when we have decided, like the Macedonian brethren, to give ourselves to God in genuine respect.

2 Corinthians 8:5 And not only as we had hoped, but they first gave themselves to the Lord, and then to us by the will of God.

- Samuel's sentiment was: "Speak, Lord, for Your servant hears."
 (1 Samuel 3:9)
 - A. What we need is the respect that is due our Master.
 - B. That will produce the submissiveness that comes from respect.
 - C. Unfortunately, we sometimes are willing to "serve" God only in an advisory capacity!
- 5. We ought to have the attitude of the "good and faithful servant"

Matthew 25:21 His lord said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant; you were faithful over a few things, I will make you ruler over many things...

Responsiveness to Divine Truth

1. Could it be that we are so withdrawn into our subjective selves that we are unresponsive to outside communication, even from God?

2. How "willing to yield" are we?

James 3:17 But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality and without hypocrisy.

- A. "Easily persuaded" (Alford); "ready to be convinced" (Knox)
- B. With respect to divine truth, do words like these describe us: tender, accessible, open, teachable, receptive, responsive, etc.?
- C. The unresponsive heart is illustrated by Pharaoh.

Exodus 5:2 And Pharaoh said, "Who is the LORD, that I should obey His voice to let Israel go? I do not know the LORD, nor will I let Israel go."

Exodus 10:3 So Moses and Aaron came in to Pharaoh and said to him, "Thus says the LORD God of the Hebrews: 'How long will you refuse to humble yourself before Me? Let My people go, that they may serve Me."

D. The responsive heart is illustrated by Josiah and Cornelius. 2 Kings 22:19

Acts 10:33 So I sent to you immediately, and you have done well to come. Now therefore, we are all present before God, to hear all the things commanded you by God.

- 3. When God speaks, is there a "sympathetic vibration" within our hearts?
 - A. Does God's word "strike a responsive chord" within us?
 - B. Is our mind "attuned" to God's mind?
 - C. Going along with responsiveness to divine truth, of course, is unresponsiveness to the temptations of the devil.
- 4. In practical terms, what does our "readiness to hear" come down to?
 - A. Are we eager to study the Bible for ourselves?
 - B. Do we honestly look forward to hearing preaching and teaching from the Bible?
 - C. How do we respond to those who come to us in the Lord's name with something we need to hear?
 - 1) Paul asked, "Have I therefore become your enemy because I tell you the truth" (Galatians 4:16).

Hebrews 13:17 Obey those who rule over you, and be submissive, for they watch out for your souls, as those who must give account. Let them do so with joy and not with grief, for that would be unprofitable for you.

5. Jesus warned:

Luke 8:18 Therefore take heed how you hear. For whoever has, to him more will be given; and whoever does not have, even what he seems to have will be taken from him."

Readiness to Obey God

- 1. How eager and ready are we to really and truly obey God?
 - A. Are we at God's "beck and call?"
 - B. Are we ready and willing to "do His bidding?"
 - C. A parent may issue this warning to a child: "I don't want to have to ask you a second time."
 - D. How many times does the Lord have to ask us to do His will?
 - 1) Reluctance to obey God is illustrated by Moses.

Exodus 4:13-14 But he said, "O my Lord, please send by the hand of whomever else You may send." So the anger of the LORD was kindled against Moses, and He said: "Is not Aaron the Levite your brother? I know that he can speak well. And look, he is also coming out to meet you. When he sees you, he will be glad in his heart.

2) Readiness to obey God is illustrated by Isaiah.

Isaiah 6:8 Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying: "Whom shall I send, And who will go for Us?" Then I said, "Here am I! Send me."

- 2. We should have a purpose for listening to God: We should be striving to live more obediently before Him.
 - A. If our Bible study is for mere curiosity, etc., we may not even see the answers to our questions when we find them.
 - B. Whether we "recognize" the Lord's "voice" when we hear it depends greatly on our attitude. This is why attitude is so very important.

John 7:17 If anyone wills to do His will, he shall know concerning the doctrine, whether it is from God or whether I speak on My own authority.

2 Thessalonians 2:10-12

- It is as if God were asking, before permitting us to discern the truth: "Why do you want to know this? What do you intend to do with this information?"
- 3. Our real degree of readiness to obey the Lord is indicated by whether we concentrate more on what we have to do or what we want to do.
- 4. Genuine eagerness to do God's will includes a willingness:
 - A. To do whatever He commands.
 - B. To do it with our full strength.
 - C. To do it without delay.

Psalms 119:60 I made haste, and did not delay To keep Your commandments.

Conclusion

- 1. We ought to act on the thought, "I will hasten to Him, hasten so glad and free."
- 2. We ought to be motivated by the kind of attitude that Paul had.
 - A. "Lord, what do you want me to do?" (Acts 9:6).
 - B. "So, as much as is in me, I am ready to preach the gospel to you who are in Rome also" (Romans 1:15).
- 3. We can and always should be, those who;

Luke 8:15 "....having heard the word with a noble and good heart, keep it and bear fruit with patience."
